From the Pastor Rev. John Steitz

There is an Appreciative Inquiry resource called SOAR that can be very helpful for affirming our gifts and present strengths, and for visioning about the future. This can be used by all kinds of groups, from committees to congregations to families. SOAR stands for Strengths, Opportunities, Aspirations, and Results. It is an alternative to SWOT (strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, threats) analysis.

SWOT moves people from strengths to weaknesses, and after looking at opportunities ends with threats. When doing a SWOT analysis people can sometimes take 15 minutes coming up with strengths, and more than an hour making detailed lists of weaknesses. Ending with threats can overwhelm potential opportunities. The SWOT process is defensive.

The SOAR process on the other hand is positive throughout. First, you anchor your inquiry in strengths. Strengths asks, "What are we great at?" Strengths seeks out the best. "In your experience, what is the best thing about...?"

Then in the second SOAR step you seek to understand the opportunities that can be built on one's strengths. Opportunities asks, "What are the possibilities?" Opportunities seeks to uncover the potential. "Using our strengths (gifts, resources) as a foundation, what potential might be created or emerge?"

From here one moves to the third step focused on hopes, dreams, and aspirations. Aspirations asks, "What do we care deeply about?" Aspirations seeks to open us to our deepest hopes and dreams. "Based on the strengths we have and the opportunities before us, what do we most deeply hope will happen?"

Finally, SOAR focuses on results. Results asks, "What are meaningful outcomes?" Results seeks to keep the process concrete. "What do we need to do to make our hopes and dreams actually happen?"

Now let us apply SOAR to our core value: Spiritually Alive. Here we ask questions related to expressions of loving God with all of strength and being in worship, in prayer, in music, and in spiritual practice.

I'll give a rough outline, but to do this well requires a small group that moves through the SOAR process together.

*** Spiritually Alive / Loving God with all our strength and being.

When it comes to loving God, in worship, in prayer, in music, and in spiritual practice...

What specific ways are we great at expressing Loving God?

What are our strengths and gifts?
What is your best experience of worship?
What helps you feel most spiritually alive?

When it comes to loving God, in worship, in prayer, in music, and in spiritual practice ...

What are the possibilities for deepening the ways that we express loving God?

What opportunities present themselves to build on our strengths?

What potential ways might help you become more spiritually alive in your life?

When we consider loving God, in worship, in prayer, in music, and in spiritual practice ...

What do we care deeply about?

What hopes, dreams, and aspirations do we have? What hopes do you have in your spiritual journey? What inspires you to love God with all your strength and being?

When we think about loving God, in worship, in prayer, in music, and in spiritual practice ...

What would we consider to be meaningful outcomes?

What are the results that we see or feel when we focus on loving God with all of our strength and being?

What realizations about loving God might we have when we are most spiritually alive?

We can do this with each of our four core values. We develop a series of questions to move us through the SOAR process on that core value. As we consider our Strengths, Opportunities, Aspirations, and Results for each core value, we will develop a deeper appreciation for the gifts we bring, and the hopes we have in living into God's call for us in living out our core values. We can also use the SOAR process to consider various

We can also use the SOAR process to consider various areas of ministry. For example, we have directors for three ministry areas: music, Christian education, and inclusive church. We can develop a series of questions to move through the SOAR process on each of these. Identifying the Strengths, Opportunities, Aspirations, and Results for each ministry area can be a spiritual process that deepens our appreciation of the ministry gifts God blesses us with, and calls us to.

Children and Family Ministries

Linda Oehme, Director

As we approach Holy Week, we need to be mindful of how we speak with children about Jesus' death. The significance of the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ is a great mystery that has preoccupied the hearts and minds of Christians for centuries. How can we tell the story Easter without overwhelming children with images that glorify violence and suffering? How can we speak of death and crucifixion as part of the good news of the Gospel?

When we speak with children about the crucifixion, it is important to emphasize that Jesus was killed by his enemies, NOT BY GOD. We also need to be very careful that we avoid giving the impression that "the Jews" killed Jesus. Jesus was a Jew, and his first followers were Jewish men and women, and the early believers worshiped in the Temple and in synagogues. It was people with religious and political power within Jesus' society who felt threatened and subsequently condemned him.

It is helpful to emphasize Jesus' course and faith, when speaking to children about the crucifixion. Jesus trusted God and advocated for the poor and powerless, despite the threats of the powerful leaders. In the resurrection, we are reassured that God's love can overcome even the bad things that people do to one another. Therefore, we are able to proclaim the good news that people do to one another. We are able to proclaim the good news that "In life, in death, in life beyond death, God is with us."

We are working on Vacation Bible School and hoping to be in person this summer. There will be an organizational meet in April. Watch for details in the weekly announcements.

UPDATED UCC Norwich Reopening GuidelinesRevised for 3/28/22

COVID Protocols that have been modified:

- Face coverings in the church building will be optional
- Social distancing of 6 feet is still recommended.
- Childcare will be available again beginning in September 2022
- Parishioners may choose their own seating in the Nave. Distancing between non-family groups is still recommended.
- Hymnals, Pew Bibles will be accessible in the pew racks and may be used.
- Congregational singing is now permitted.
- Prayer requests may be spoken during the worship service or may be submitted in the prayer basket. (Usher will bring microphone around to congregation. Microphone cover will be supplied)
- Coffee Hour will resume April 24, 2022 and will be hosted and coordinated by the Deacons.

COVID Protocols that remain in place:

- Passing of the peace will continue to be suspended at this time.
- Offerings will be collected by placing your envelope in a basket upon entering or exiting the Nave.
- Communion will be offered in the pews using individually portioned elements.
- Hearing assistive devices will be available for those that need them. You will receive the headset in a bag. Please write your name on the bag and store the headset in the same bag for use during future services.
- Hand sanitizing stations are located near the Nave entrance hall and in each pew. Please wash your hands or
 use sanitizing stations frequently.
- We ask that if you are not feeling well and /or may be exhibiting cold or flu-like symptoms, that you refrain from attending until you feel better.
- Disinfection Plan: our Custodian will disinfect all high touch surfaces, including rest rooms and seating areas, before and/or after weekly services.
