Hurricane Lesson: Riptides

This fall, we learned a great deal about hurricanes: what contributes to their strength, their effects, and the devastation they leave behind. A hurricane's winds, rainfall, and storm surge all contribute to its destructive power. A less familiar danger associated with storm surge is riptides or rip currents. When ocean water is pushed toward shore by a hurricane – or any kind of offshore phenomenon such as an ocean current – that water must eventually return to the ocean. When it does, it often takes the form of a fast moving current heading out toward the open sea. Riptides can be deadly because they're often hard to spot and quickly pull any swimmer caught in them away from land. Trying to swim against a riptide is a no-win proposition for even the strongest swimmer. The only workable alternative is to swim parallel to the beach until a swimmer is no longer caught in a riptide's current. Hopefully, that doesn't take place too far from shore and the swimmer can return to dry land unharmed – albeit probably scared and exhausted – from the experience.

In a few days, the presidential election is almost certainly going to feel like a hurricane making landfall. The night of the fifth will bring a great deal of drama and tension with it. That drama and tension will continue as the votes around the country are tallied and – we all know this is going to happen – results will be contested. Trying to maintain one's sense of equilibrium and sanity will be like trying to swim against a riptide. A great deal of self-care in the form of prayer, exercise, meditation, regular walks outside, gazing into the night sky, stepping away from online and newscast reporting and speculation, “doom-scrolling” through social media feeds, avoiding discussion of the election with “challenging” family members, perhaps even some adult beverages will all be needed for the foreseeable future. In other words, swimming out of the riptide until you're able to make it back to some semblance of order in your life. Don't forget to ask for God's help in that process. If you're feeling overwhelmed these next few weeks (or months), let God help you make your way back to shore.

As for what happens after that, we'll deal with it then – with God's help.

Stewardship

Greetings All,

It is the time of year again where we begin to look at next year's budget and try to lay out our spending plan and what our income resources would look like for the upcoming year. A part of this plan is to start thinking about stewardship and how each one of us can contribute to our plan to make a difference in our community.

According to Webster's, stewardship is "the careful and responsible management of something entrusted to one's care". With this in mind, consideration should be given to our responsibility of supervision of the Church's assets both from a physical perspective in regards to the buildings and infrastructure, as well as the financial resources. This part, to me, seems kind of straight forward with our on-going efforts in maintenance and repair of the physical buildings, keeping the lights on, staff compensation, and legal requirements; all of this helps in "preserving our space" as a church in the community. I truly believe that there is an additional part to the whole stewardship picture. In addition to preserving our space, we should be making a difference in the community and helping people in need. We currently have many programs that do just that. Programs like the Local Missions, which have discretion in supporting various local requests, the Food Pantry, The Place, Scholarships for Students, and support to the Broad Street United Methodist Monthly Community Dinner. This is only a partial list and I can go on and on as to the "help" supplied by our Church.

Over the years we have heard messages that speak to God's love. What is God's love? God's love sees a world where no one is in need, a world where each person feels empowered to fully become who they are. So, with this being said, in this season of stewardship I would challenge everyone to ask the question, "How is God calling you to respond?"

The congregations here at UCC Norwich have been very fortunate in having our forefathers invest in the future of this church and its sustainability in this community. We are fortunate not to worry about the need for fundraising to support the basic functions of the church. The endowment of the church allows for continuous operation of the church as an organization and is the primary funding source of the church. I would like to reiterate that all moneys collected in our collection plates throughout the year are directly returned to the community through our outreach ministries programs. This message of stewardship is a request for each person to assess your individual situation, search your heart, and determine what you alone can contribute to or are willing to do to support the work of God's love. There is no pledge too small. Please give prayerful consideration for the level of our contribution to support the work of God's love. I would like thank you for your past pledge and to ask you to consider your contribution plans for 2025.

Finally, there is only one more thing to mention. It's the practical stuff. Enlistment Sunday is November 10th. Pledge cards are also available at the church office. We ask that the office receive pledge cards by December 6th so the Finance committee can prudently work toward finalizing a budget.

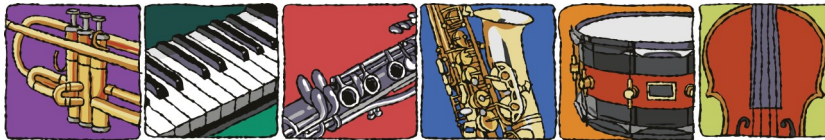

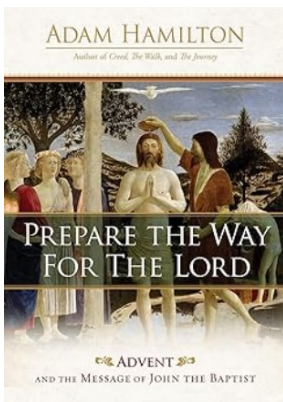
On October 13 Emma Palmer joined the choir on flute for the anthem *For the Beauty of the Earth*.

What: *Prepare the Way for the Lord: Advent and the Message of John the Baptist*

Overview: For over 2000 years, Christians have turned to John the Baptist's story and message in the weeks before Christmas. - Witnesses Testifying to the Light

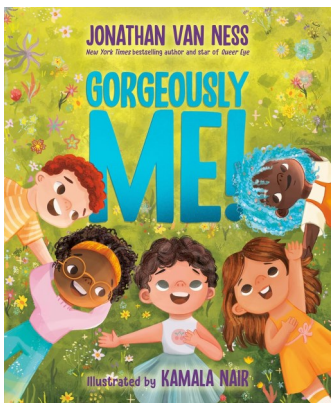

Our Sunday School/Youth Room also received a splash of color in the form of new wall decor and softer, more colorful couch pillows. Check out the photos! And if you can't tell from the photo, we have three beautiful new framed canvas posters hanging above our Sunday School bulletin boards. From left to right they say "We Rise by Lifting Others," "Everyone is Welcome Here," and "We Come in All Shades of Beautiful." The goal is for our youth to be surrounded by positive and affirming messages when they spend time in our space here. I'd like to think we have done that!



Recently, we read a new book during one of our Sunday morning Children's Moments. If you missed it, check out the live service recording from 10/20/24. For anyone interested, the book is titled *Gorgeously Me!* by Jonathan Van Ness. The book, kind of like our Sunday School/Youth Room, tries to empower and encourage youth through the richness of the written word. It sends messages such as: Don't be afraid to stand out. Show the world who you are. Be true to yourself. Use your friends for support. Admit when you are wrong. Talk things out. Tell people you love them. Spend time with friends. Spread joy. Be proud of who you are.

But perhaps the most important message comes toward the end. Listen to these words: "How will you be the best you? Spread love to others and love yourself too. Fill those around you with hope, joy, and trust. And turn gorgeously me into gorgeously US!" I think the message is clear. Love yourself and spread that love to others. It is the love that comes from God that will fill others with hope, joy, and trust. Only then can the Kingdom of Heaven grow! So spread that love!

Our next Sunday School unit will focus on what it means to be a leader. When you hear the word "leader," you might think about an influential artist or celebrity, or a famous politician, or a coach on a soccer field, or that kid who just got elected class president. And, sure, those people are definitely leaders! But these aren't the only ways to lead. Great leaders don't have to have official positions, titles, or people who report to them. With God, being a great leader is something anyone can achieve because leadership is simply about becoming the kind of person who's *worth following*. But how? In this four-week series called *Most Likely To*, we'll look at the example of Jesus, plus ordinary people like Moses, Solomon, and the apostle Paul, who were all given opportunities to lead and make a difference in others' lives. Through their examples (both good and bad), we'll see how great leaders are the people most likely to **follow through, choose to love, choose integrity, and follow God's lead**.
