# From the Pastor

# 'Woke' Jesus

There's a sentiment in some Christian circles that congregations embracing Jesus as being "woke," is "...the single greatest threat to the modern church since the first century." <sup>1</sup> In some political circles, being woke about – anything – is as roundly criticized and considered to be as much of a threat to the American way of life as Communism was during the McCarthy era in the 1950s. What then does being "woke" mean in the manner it's being used today?

According to Elaine Richardson, Professor of Literacy Studies at Ohio State, "It comes out of Black culture. In simple terms, it just means being politically conscious and aware, like 'stay woke'... It comes out of the experience of Black people of knowing that you have to be conscious of the politics of race, class, gender, systemic racism, ways that society is stratified and not equal."<sup>2</sup>

As for how being woke applies to Jesus and Christianity, we have to go back to the early 20<sup>th</sup> century theologian, Walter Rauschenbusch, of Colgate Rochester Divinity School. He popularized the concept of the social gospel, that the central focus of Christ's ministry and our ongoing focus as Christians were to care for "the least of these" in society. That is, being woke to the plight of the poor.

"Isn't that obvious," we might ask? After all, at the start of his ministry, Jesus announced he had been anointed by God to "bring Good News to the poor, to proclaim release of the captives, recovery of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who have been bruised, to proclaim that the year which everyone has waited for has come." He later made it clear the top two commandments were to love God and love our neighbor as ourselves.

As has happened with other Black-oriented concepts in current American culture (ie., "Black Lives Matter" and Critical Race Theory), being woke has stirred up racist resentments, especially among conservative white American Evangelicals. Add a rainbow banner and it's obvious a congregation has gone to the dark side by becoming woke. (Oops!)

In reading through arguments made against Christian "wokeness," a central point is that a pastor, congregation, denomination, and theology *must* follow biblical teaching and *only* biblical teaching to be considered legitimate. From my perspective, that eliminates the guidance of the Holy Spirit in our lives as Christians. Jesus told his disciples that after he was gone, God would send another, an advocate or helper to continue reminding us of the lessons he tried to teach humanity during the course of his ministry. Jesus also made clear that disrespecting the Holy Spirit was the only sin that would never be forgiven. Both would seem to be *very* compelling reasons to continue listening to and respecting the Holy Spirit.

That doesn't mean ignoring what we learn from Scripture, however, it does mean we don't make an idol out of the Bible. Time and again, Scripture makes clear we're to care for the homeless, hungry, naked, those in prison, and to welcome the strangers among us. (I'll preach on Jesus' sermon on the mount in a few weeks.) That sense of empathy for the plight of "the least of these" is the essence of Jesus' ministry and of being woke. If making a choice between listening to what the Holy Spirit continues to tell us about being authentic students of the Risen Christ – or – getting caught up in a politically-inspired mindset, my suggestion is we stick with the former and say "no thanks" to the latter.

# Insomnia Insight: We're All Here to Help.

I haven't had a full night's sleep in decades. Chronic insomnia. I eventually realized the thoughts waking me up at 3 a.m. were insights from my subconscious / the universe / almost certainly God. The ancients considered that time of night to be when the veil between our sense of reality and a greater reality was the thinnest. Keeping an iPad within reach, I often write down whatever insomnia insights present themselves. Often what makes sense at 3 a.m. doesn't hold up at 10 a.m. My latest has held up in daylight and I've found to be enormously helpful:

(1/26, 3:50 a.m.) Do you understand or are even aware of all that makes up your entire self? The same is true with everything else. We're all part of a universal consciousness / experience. It's all connected: past; present; future; living; dead; all that was, is, or ever will be

When one part of the system is in pain or is unhealthy, the rest responds to assist. Pathogens will always arise that require an immune response. They're nothing personal or unusual; they're merely part of the experience. Our maintaining / building our own health and strength helps reinforce the health and strength of the entire system. When we're healthy, we're literally part of the universal immune response to that which is unhealthy.

# From the Moderator

Here we are through the end of the first month of the new year. This is the time when most new year resolutions have fallen by the wayside and people have gotten back into their normal routines of getting through each day. I would like to take this opportunity to bring you up to speed with some activities and opportunities we have in store for us at the church. For the ones who have not been in the church recently, we have now purchased and installed an AED (automatic external defibrillator) which is available in case of an emergency. Along with that we had a CPR/AED training class for any church members and have several folks trained and qualified for the operation of this unit.

There are several opportunities/projects in our future that have the opportunity for folks to get involved with work, both to be recognized in the community and to help people that may be less fortunate than us. If you have heard me talk at our meetings, you have heard me say a time or two that I feel the church, with its financial resources, is active in helping projects with financial support but when it comes to bodies and hands-on support, I feel we fall short. I do understand that there are some reasons for this but I am raising a several opportunities where someone can lend a hand and not feel overburdened with a ton of work.

This year we have budgeted money to upgrade our kitchen area here at the church. This area is used by many organizations throughout the year, as well as by us Sunday mornings. We would like input from all that use this space for consideration when making decisions going forward and will be reaching out these other organizations for their responses. In addition, we would like some people closer to the kitchen work to help with the design and to assess the current china, glassware, place settings, pot & pans, and kitchen utensils as to what is necessary or a desire to keep and store. When looking forward to cabinet space and storage needs, we need to be aware of what we really need. Other considerations to think about is floor finish, wall color, electrical outlet needs, and lighting. Please consider lending your expertise or opinion or even to attend a meeting to discuss with all involved. Support would be appreciated.

As most of you know we financially support the Broad Street United Methodist Church with its monthly community dinner. I would like to open up the opportunity for anyone to contact them or speak with me for information on how to get involved with the preparation and distribution of these meals. This is an easy way to be a part of our "final exam test" mentioned numerous times by J.K. We can help feed the hungry even if it as simple as a conversation during their time at this event.

Thanks to Jane Prime and her observations, I have initiated actions to determine ownership of the signs at both the north and south ends of the city which display the faith organizations within the city. These signs are in poor shape with the one at the south end starting to fall down. I am proposing to organize a plan to restore these signs. Restoring these signs will send the message that our faith organizations are an important part of our community. I have reached out to my friends at the Elks Club here in Norwich for a possible joint effort in the restoration of these signs. There is much support from our organizations to make this happen and will be looking for anyone to lend a hand with this endeavor in the future. We are in the early stages of this project but when the weather gets nicer, we will be doing something about this. Please consider how you may support this project.

The Church leadership is making an open invitation to a new member orientation process for anyone interested. This invitation is open to all ages who may want to officially become a member of the church or just renew their faith commitment. Details of exactly what this will entail is still in the works, but if there is any interest in becoming a new member or if you would like more information on what that may look like, speak to either J.K. or myself. I have been assured by J.K. that this will be painless and not be drawn out into a time-consuming lengthy process.

Finally, if it has not yet started, you will be seeing some equipment in the parking lot as we have a project going on in the basement of the church to attempt to address a couple of issues. There are several support posts that are in need of replacing as well as work to put down a moisture barrier to attempt to minimize the humidity level in the area. The moisture in this area has a way of working up into the building and, unfortunately, into the organ components, which is really not a good thing. Last year there were a couple projects to attempt to address the water leaking through the basement walls contributing to this issue. These have been completed and this moister barrier is the next item on our list to address this issue.

I conclude my message with a big **Thank You** to the over 20 action committees that do a bunch of the work within the church. It has been 6 months since we transitioned to our one leadership structure and things seem to be working to keep the wheels turning. As always, I will say that there is always something to get involved with if you have any desire. The one quote of my mother's I will continue to share:

"Many Hands Make Light Work."

## **SUNDAY SCHOOL**

Here's what we're learning for January and February 2025:

### JANUARY - BENEATH THE SURFACE: A 4-Week Series from the Gospels on Identity

Who do you think you are? You might define your identity by the things people see on the surface — like your style, your look, your abilities, or your reputation. Those things might have something to do with who you are, but they don't quite capture the whole picture, do they? For each of us, there is always so much more to who we are beneath the surface. But who are we, really? How can we discover who God made us to be? And how can following Jesus shape who we're becoming? In this four-week series, we'll look at four moments from the early years of Jesus' life. As we do, we'll see how God helps us discover who we're becoming and how God's words help us discover who we are. We'll also learn how the right relationships help us discover how to grow and how Jesus helps us discover purpose.

### FEBRUARY- RHYTHM: A 4-Week Series from 1 & 2 Corinthians on Spiritual Growth

For a lot of us, music is a central part of our lives. In the car, at school, or walking through a store, music gives us a steady rhythm that plays in the background. But the predictable beats and patterns of our favorite songs can do more than just entertain or inspire us — they can teach us something about growing closer to Jesus, too. While growing in our faith can sometimes feel difficult to measure, the right rhythms can help us keep moving in the right direction. In this four-week series, we'll explore passages of Scripture from the Gospels, epistles, and Psalms that help us develop spiritual rhythms that help us grow. Together, we'll be challenged to create more predictable patterns in four key ways: by creating rhythms for spending time with God, using our gifts, sharing our stories, and spending time with others.



# Free AARP Tax Preparation Services

The AARP Foundation's TaxAide program is once again offering free preparation of federal and New York State income tax returns for individuals of all ages and income levels. Tax preparation services will be available by appointment only from



February 10 to April 14 on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays in our Founders Room. No walk-ins will be accepted.

Although some individuals with low incomes may not be required to file taxes, the AARP encourages everyone to file annually to claim potential tax credits and to guard against identity theft, which can occur if someone files a fraudulent return using your Social Security number.

While the service is free, donations to the AARP Foundation are welcome. The TaxAide program can assist with most tax returns, but certain complex situations may not be included, such as foreclosures, farms, rental income, businesses, self-employment with offsetting expenses, 1099-K income with offsetting expenses, energy tax credits, and digital currency transactions.

Must I be perfect in the manner in which I live?


Instead, you ask that we speak our truth, our authenticity from the depths of our souls-



- Scholarships can be used for post-secondary undergraduate education.
- Preference will be given to UCC members, UCC employees, and the children/grandchildren of UCC members and UCC employees.
- Awards for graduating seniors will be presented at the Dollars for Scholars Presentation.
- The awards will be made on character, service, scholarship and financial considerations. Some awards have additional criteria as noted.
