From the Moderator

Following a prayerful and faithful process of discernment, and after a successful congregational vote held on Sunday, August 3, we are pleased to officially confirm the call of Rev. Glenn Mahaffey as the next pastor of the United Church of Christ, First Congregational of Norwich.

This decision reflects the shared hope, vision, and enthusiasm of our congregation as we step into a new chapter of ministry together. Rev. Mahaffey brings a spirit of compassion, a deep commitment to the Gospel, and a passion for building community. We are confident that his leadership will help guide us forward with faith, courage, and love.

We invite you to join us in welcoming Rev. Mahaffey with open hearts and open arms. His ministry with us will begin on September 1, 2025, and a formal service of installation will be scheduled in collaboration with the Susquehanna Association in the near future. More details will be shared soon.

We give thanks to God for the work of the Transition Team and Search Committee, the prayers and participation of the entire congregation, and most of all, for the call we share as a church—to be the hands and feet of Christ in the world.

Let us continue to pray for Rev. Mahaffey and for one another as we embrace this joyful new beginning.

A Little About Rev. Glenn Mahaffey



"My call to ordained ministry happened early in my life as a child. I found Jesus as a young teenager, through an organization called Young Life." Glenn began his journey to ordained ministry in 1982, and was ordained as a Priest in 1985. He served as a pastor in the Episcopal Church in seven different congregations, but always felt "somewhat out of place in the Episcopal Church". Fast forward nine years, he found himself in the Episcopal Church in Norwich. At that time he would periodically meet with Joe Connolly from UCC Norwich finding they had much in common and would prepare sermons together and worked with Joe on community projects. He married his second wife at the Norwich UCC. Glenn retired from the Episcopal ministry in 2015 and moved to Norwich and began attending the UCC. He discussed with Joe Connoelly the procedure for becoming an authorized minister at UCC to assist in

church ministry. At that time he was immediately asked to serve as a part-time pastor for a troubled congregation in Binghamton, NY where he has been for the past nine years until completing this journey at the end of June 2025.

Glenn loves to preach and uses preaching as a tool to try and connect scripture with daily life to inform people about the issues we face in the world of people of faith. He loves teaching classes in scripture, church history and development of theology. He has worked on boards for community mental health and addiction, local boards of food pantries and feeding programs and a community board for setting up a homeless shelter, which he finds to be rewarding work!

Outside of the church building, Glenn enjoys spending time with his family. His wife, Naomi and daughter, Heavenly are a special part of his life. Naomi and Heavenly are actively involved in our church already through music and action committees. Heavenly is actively a part of our bell choir and often plays solos and/or duets with other musicians. Glenn feels that music is "the most powerful form of art and can be manipulative." He states that "our UCC church has so many dynamics and a good choir." With Glenn's teaching background he holds a special place in his heart for children! He says that "the center of church is relationships and children need to feel safe at 'home'."

Finally, Glenn has spent 22 years in Norwich and owns his home with his wife and daughter. As Glenn states, "I feel like at UCC I may finally get to minister in the way which I can fully be what God is calling me to be."

From the Pastor Rev. Glenn Mahaffey

Dear sisters and brothers in Christ,

I feel so fortunate to be able to join you as you live out a life of faith here at UCC. I was reading your priorities as a congregation some time ago and was struck by the realization that you are a spiritual community I can agree with. I don't need to do any "theological gymnastics" to appreciate and accept the precepts of UCC. You have done great work in this community for many years. In short, you are a unique and unrepeatable miracle of God!

One of the most meaningful scriptures for me was written by the Apostle Paul from a prison cell on his way to be executed in Rome. Paul writes to the Philippians in chapter 4:4-7 *"Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice! Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near. Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus."* NSRV

People may ask us in this day and age, what is a Christian. St. Paul's answer is not just a matter of belief, but in how a Christian acts. Let us rejoice in the Lord at all times and let us be known for our gentleness, because the Lord is near. Don't be overcome with anxiety but instead pour out your needs and concerns before God, being thankful that you are being heard. If we do these things, the Peace of God will *guard our heart and mind* in the *knowledge of God*.

I would like to encourage us all to attempt to live out these spiritual exercises. It is our faith lived out in our lives as individuals and as a spiritual community that will keep us centered and stable in the midst of the craziness of our world.

Another name for the "peace" of God which St. Paul is referring to is "shalom". Shalom is more than just a feeling or a lack of conflict. Shalom refers to the ability to exist in harmonious relationship with God and human beings and creation *under any conditions*. Shalom is like an internal gyroscope, a tool that "provides stability or maintains a reference direction in navigation systems." So as the storm winds blow in our world and sends the waves of life to batter us at times, the presence of shalom keeps us stable. This gyroscope prevents us from capsizing and going under. This is a peace that surpasses human understanding, it is a gift of God, it is a grace which is always accessible to us in a life of faith.

And can God really use each of us to do big things in the world. We'll explore what the story of Moses and the Israelites can help us discover about doubt and belief. We'll talk about how, when you doubt yourself, God can still use you. And we'll see how, when you doubt God, it's okay to ask questions because God still offers guidance and always takes care of you.

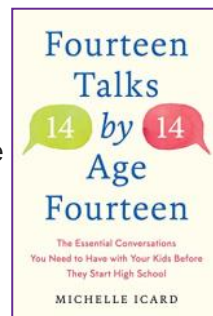


FREE 2B ME YOUTH GROUP

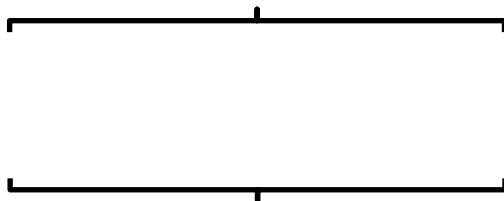
