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From the Pastor

Dear sisters and brothers,

We are so blessed to have one another in this UCC congregation! If you think about it, there are many people who live around us that don't have a faith community. The great majority of people in our community don't have a group of people who they can just "be with" and be part of a larger conversation. Most people don't have a network outside of their family (if they have any family who they are close to) who will care and pray for them if they are sick, who will try to be a support in a time of trouble, giving a ride, providing a meal. UCC is such a family of faith, as Deb Phelps, our moderator, greets us whenever she is the liturgist "good morning UCC family!" We are a family who makes an effort to show hospitality and welcome to anyone, regardless of their economic level, their gender, sexual orientation, race, or differing physical abilities.

Some people question what the Church is doing in the midst of the needy and often unjust world in which we live. I think Pete Williams had a solid response to this question in his stewardship letter as to how our monetary resources, our time and our efforts are used in this church. The resources given work together to create a community of refuge amid a very confusing, conflicted, fearful, suffering world. Our donation of money, time, and effort supports people locally as well as help fund a larger witness through regional and national ministries of UCC.

This congregation has worked diligently for many years to support local ministries such as The Place, who run programs for children and families. We are an important part of the network to help provide some degree of a safety net to those who are struggling in our community through the Deacon's Fund and local outreach. Let's not forget the Thanksgiving baskets, a ministry that has been going on at this Church for well over thirty years! We are increasing the number of baskets to 150 this year, since we always have so many more in need than we have baskets to offer. These ministries are not just in the past, they are currently happening, and new opportunities are no doubt on the horizon as we continue to assess needs around issues of homelessness, food insecurity, and the impact of the cutbacks in federal and state programs.

We don't always see tangible immediate results from our efforts at being an open, loving and forgiving community of Christians. Yet, we must not lose heart! We are in it for the long haul and very much like faith communities written about in the scriptures. The Holy Spirit is always at work opening our eyes to discern the path where Jesus is leading us. I am always lifted up by remembering the words of Hebrews 11:1 which says: "*Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen.*" Like the Hebrews in the wilderness, if we ever arrive at a place where we feel we should be, God is always calling us beyond that place, to continue to live in faith, not a life of certainty. Thank you for allowing me to be a part of the UCC family here. You truly are a refuge of God's light and compassion in the midst of a world that is at war with itself and I am proud to be a part of your life and ministry!

“My refuge and my fortress, my God in whom I trust.” – Psalm 91:2

The psalmist reminds us that God is our refuge — a shelter, a place of safety, a high hill for the weary, a bridge over wild waters, a shadow from the scorching sun, hope in the midst of evil, a firm foundation when the world shakes (Joel 3), and truth amid the lies that surround us (Isaiah 28:15).

What does refuge look like in your life?

When I think about refuge, I often picture places that bring me peace: a comfortable chair overlooking a quiet landscape or sunset; a familiar room with a warm blanket that surrounds me in comfort; a childhood spot filled with good memories and wisdom I still carry with me. These are places I can return to in times of need.

Refuge can also be found in people — a dear friend with whom you reconnect instantly, no matter how much time has passed; a family member whose hug releases a deep sigh and reminds you that you are cared for; a spouse or partner whose touch calms fear and assures you of unconditional love.

Refuge is life-giving. Refuge is holy. And yet, perhaps the greatest challenge is this: not only must we seek refuge, we are also called to be refuge — to become places and people of safety, comfort, and strength for others, for as long as God gives us the energy and grace to do so.

We pray, Amen

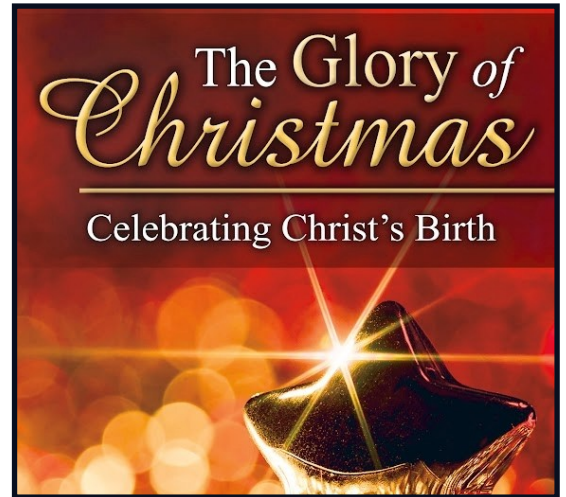
Music Ministries

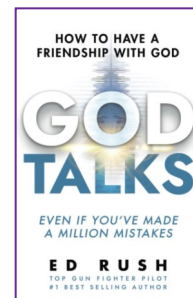

BOOK OF THE MONTH

Do you often wonder what it would feel like to have a deeper connection with God? In *God Talks*, Ed Rush invites readers into a conversational journey with the divine—teaching that everyone can learn to ask meaningful questions of God, receive guidance, and “recode” their life for greater success, purpose, and fulfillment. Rather than presenting spirituality as distant or reserved for the *perfect*, Rush emphasizes that real transformation begins when we confront limiting beliefs rooted in our past, open ourselves to a deeper connection with God, and align our daily choices (including our work, finances, and relationships) with a higher purpose.

At its core, this book encourages the idea that God wants to speak with you, your mistakes don't exclude you from a relationship with God, and your spiritual life is not separate from your practical life, but deeply entwined.



As the pace of November begins to pick up with school, work, and the holiday season fast approaching, let's not forget to pause and seek the One who gives us true rest. In the midst of our full schedules and constant distractions, may we be intentional about slowing down, quieting our hearts, and spending time with God. Understanding Alzheimer's Disease: What to Do if You Notice the Signs

From Chenango County Department of Public Health

November is Alzheimer's Awareness Month, a time to learn more about this serious disease that affects millions of people and their families around the world. Alzheimer's disease is the most common type of dementia, which means it causes problems with memory, thinking, and behavior. Today, there are 426,500 New Yorkers aged 65 and older living with the disease. It typically develops slowly and worsens over time, making it harder for people to do everyday tasks.

The first signs of Alzheimer's can be easy to overlook. Many people forget things occasionally, especially as they age, but Alzheimer's causes more severe memory loss that can significantly interfere with daily life. Someone might forget recently learned information, struggle to follow conversations, get lost in familiar places, or have trouble handling money or planning activities. Mood and personality changes can also happen. They may become confused, anxious, or withdrawn.

While there is currently no cure for Alzheimer's disease, early detection is very important. If you notice any signs in yourself or a loved one, the best step is to talk to a doctor as soon as possible. Doctors can do tests to check memory and thinking skills, rule out other conditions that might cause similar symptoms, and help plan treatment or recommend support services. Memory problems can also come from things like medication side effects, vitamin deficiencies, or stress.

Caring for someone with Alzheimer's can be challenging, but no one has to face it alone. There are support groups, community programs, and resources available through organizations like the Alzheimer's Association. Staying active, eating healthy foods, getting enough sleep, and keeping the brain engaged with reading, puzzles, or social activities may also help slow the effects of memory loss. Awareness and compassion can make a meaningful difference in the lives of those living with Alzheimer's — and their families.

So get ready to create your favorite "goody" to share and bring it on the Second Sunday in November to celebrate our new "Coffee Hour to Share."

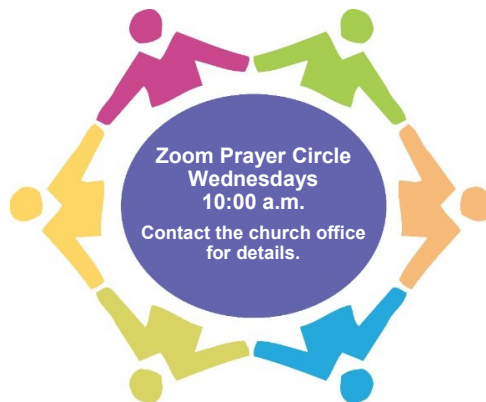

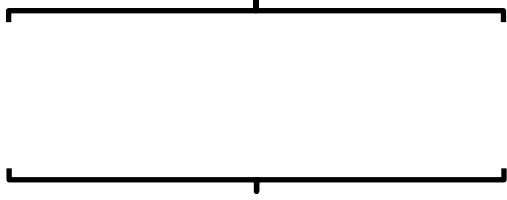
